Near future, simple future, immediate future, present tense — are you feeling muddled up?! Or perhaps you just want to make sure you understand them all?

These exercises will help you get your head around the future tenses in French.

Example:

Your friend found out she was pregnant, what would you say in French?

Level 1: Elle va avoir un bébé. Elle aura un bébé. Elle est sur le point d'avoir un bébé.

Level 2: (avoir un bébé) → Elle va avoir un bébé.

 Je suis sûre qu'il pleure il pleurera il va pleurer il est sur le point de pleurer.








What would you say?

- 1. You are walking in the countryside with a friend. She's about to fall in a ditch, what would you say in French?

 Attention! Tu tomberas! Tu vas tomber! Tu es sur le point de tomber!

 (The last option is too long, the person would be in the ditch before you even finished the sentence!)
- 2. You heard tomorrow's weather forecast on the radio. What would you say in French? Demain, il est sur le point de pleuvoir. Il pleuvra. Il va pleuvoir. Il pleut.
- 3. Clouds are threatening your picnic. What would you say in French?

 Oh la la! Il pleut! Il va pleuvoir! Il est sur le point de pleurer! (Watch out for the trap! pleurer = 'to cry') Il pleuvra!
- 4. You haven't slept much the night before and you suddenly feel very tired, what would you say in French?

 Bon, je me couche je me vais coucher (Watch out! The reflexive pronoun goes between aller and the infinitive)

 je suis sur le point de me coucher je vais me coucher.
- You found the perfect gift for your friend and you know he'll feel emotional.
 You are about to give it to him, what would you say in French?

 Je suis sûre qu'il pleure il pleurera (You are 100 percent sure, so it can't be the simple future) il va pleurer il est sur le point de pleurer.

C

Subtitles

- Ça y est, j'ai réservé mes billets et l'hôtel : je **pars** OR **vais partir** à la fin du mois.
 - → Both work. Using the present tense makes it more vibrant.

Je **vais changer** d'air.

- → Result of the current situation.
- Tu as raison de partir, ça **te fera peut-être** du bien.
 - → Peut-être implies a doubt, hence the simple future.
- Ah non, c'est sûr et certain que ça **va me faire** un bien fou.
 - → Sûr et certain implies certainty hence the near future.

Je **repars / vais repartir** à zéro.

- → Both work.
- Tu **m'écriras** ? Tu **m'enverras** des emails au moins, hein ?
 - \rightarrow There is a doubt, hence the future tense. Also, make sure me turns into m' in front of a vowel!



Translation

- 1. S'il pleut, je resterai à la maison.
- **2.** Quand **il arrivera, on sera / nous serons en train de** manger.
 - → If you just translated it into "on mangera / nous mangerons" it would mean you'll start eating then, not that you will **already** be eating.
- 3. Pendant qu'il dormira, on jouera / nous jouerons aux cartes.
- 4. Dès qu'il aura 18 ans, il ira en Europe.
- 5. Une fois qu'elle sera là, ils commenceront le film.
